2010 Camping Opportunities

Cub Scout Overnights – hosted by districts

Open to all registered Cubs and adult partners

- June 19 – 20
- June 26 – 27
- July 17 – 18

Bear Resident Camp

- July 22 – 24

Webelos Resident Camp

- July 8 – 10
- July 18 – 20

Family Resident Camp

- July 3 – 5 – open to all ages
- Scouting and Non-Scouting groups
- Camp in your own tent, camper, or motor homes.
- There is a nightly camping fee, and a individual program fee.



Pack Option

Cub Scout Overnight

This day only option has been eliminated.
No one remembers it being used.

There was no cost difference, and people
can sign out when they need to.



Camp fees and deadlines

- Payment must be submitted with registration.
 - Early Bird special – in Scout Shop by closing time Tues. May 18
 - Final Registration is Friday 5 pm 2 weeks prior to each camp
- One camp shirt is included in youth fee, adult purchase optional.

Fees have been corrected to 2010 amounts.

Cub Scout Overnights – Camp Wakonda

- \$45 per Scout (*early bird special*) – *no fee for adult partner*
- \$60 per Scout – after early bird

Bear Resident Camp – Camps Waubeek & Wakonda

- \$100 per Scout & \$45 per Leader (*early bird special*)
- \$115 per Scout & \$55 per Leader – after early bird

Webelos Resident Camp – Camp Wakonda

- \$100 per Scout & \$45 per Leader (*early bird special*)
- \$115 per Scout & \$55 per Leader – after early bird

Family Camping at Camp Wakonda

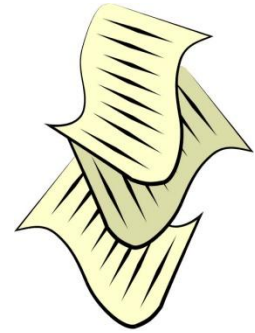
- **\$10 per night per camping unit, plus \$2 per person fee**

Proper Adult Leadership



- Cub Overnight
 - 1 adult partner per Scout (1:1)
- Two-deep leadership for all others, with a min. of 2 adults per max of 8 youth. Use 1:4 ratio if there are more youth.
 - Bear and Webelos resident camps
 - Family resident camp - Troops/patrols or packs/dens need a minimum of 2 deep leadership and proper ratio adults to youth.

Registration Check List



- On-line registration begins **April 15**
Instructions will be given when testing complete.
- Each pack will need a registration coordinator
 - Collect copies of medical forms (next screen)
 - Collect fees and submit registration with payment as a Pack (including medical forms)
- Early Bird registration is good through Tues. **May 18**, with final deadline indicated for each camp (about 2 weeks before camp)

Medical Forms for **Everyone**

BSA Medical Forms required for all at camp

- Parts A&C for all campers and staff – youth and adults
- Part B (physical) is recommended, but not required
- Keep original at home, and furnish a copy with registration.

Prescription and over-the-counter drugs

- Medicines must be listed on medical form.
- **All** medication must be in original container with person's name and proper dosage. Bring only the quantity needed.
Absolutely no medicine to be kept in campsite or vehicles
- **All** medication must be turned over to Health Officer upon arrival and kept in that office. Excluded are medications that must be carried at all times, such as inhalers, Nitro, Epi-pens
- Scouts and adults are responsible for obtaining medicine from Health Officer during meal times.

Camperships and Refunds

Both forms are available through Council office or website for all camps except Family Camp.



- Campership application deadline May 1
- Refund request deadline **August 31**

May be requested for:

- Illness of registered Scout or adult partner
- Illness or death of a family member.
- Relocation outside of Council

In September, the amount of refund, if any, is determined by committee.

Facilities

- Camping sites will be assigned
 - Each site has a small shelter with toilet and running water
 - Handicap accessible campsite is available upon request
- Showers
 - Available at swimming pool
 - Risk Management mandates separate facilities for youth/adult and male/female
- Trading Post - open at posted times at all events
 - Scout merchandise, souvenirs, snacks, beverages
 - A small amount of spending money is appropriate (\$10-\$15)

Tents

- The council strongly encourages all participants to bring their own tents with mosquito netting, floor, and “No flames in tent” sign or tag.
- Camp had some canvas tents (no floor, no mosquito netting) available upon request



Risk Management

- Identification
 - Staff will have ID tag, campers will have wristbands
 - Visitors will receive a wristband when they check in at Camp Office
- Leaving and returning to camp
 - Anyone going or coming must sign log at Camp Office
 - Known departures should be identified at registration
- Buddy System – no lone Scouts
 - Buddy System will be enforced at all times
- Photos will be taken. Parental approval must be marked on Part C of BSA Medical form.

What to Bring (more complete in parent guide)

- Tent, ground cover, sleeping bag, mattress, pillow
- Full scout uniform for Bear and Webelos camps only. Leave loose award items at home. They will get t-shirt
- **Comfortable closed-toed shoes**
- Weather appropriate clothes
- underwear , socks plus extras
- Poncho, rain suit, or jacket
- Swim suit and towel
- Water bottle or canteen
- Ashes from last year campfire
- Bathroom kit: towel, soap, toothbrush, toothpaste, etc
- Sun screen or sun block (not sun tan lotion)
- Hat
- Non-aerosol insect repellent
- No aerosols of any kind (OK for medical use only)
- Flashlight, extra batteries
- Pencil and paper
- Scout Handbook
- Spending money
- **Wagon to move items to campsite**

Restricted or Prohibited

NO open toed shoes. They are a safety risk, so leave them at home.

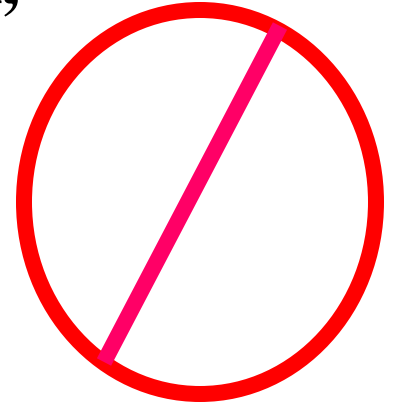
No medicine in campsite or vehicles
(health risk)

Tobacco products

- Only in designated smoking areas
- Never within sight of Scouts
- Minors are not allowed in the smoking area

These will result in immediate dismissal

- Alcohol of any kind – Camp is an alcohol free site
- Illegal Drugs of any kind
- Fireworks, sparklers, or other like items



Cub Overnight Program

Held at Camp Wakonda

- Staffed activities with no set rotation
 - BB gun, Archery
 - Fishing
 - Swimming
 - Crafts
- Advancement items are printed in handout to track with their adult partner.
- Meals provided - Dinner and next day breakfast
- Interfaith Chapel Service
- Organized Campfire

Bear Resident Camp Program

Combination of Camps Waubeek and Wakonda

- Boys are grouped into Dens with a staff guide
- Dens rotate through preset activity blocks
- Includes all meals except lunch on check in day
- Fun Activities
 - Archery, BB, Climbing, Swimming, craft
- Advancement activities
 - Belt loops, Achievements, electives
- Interfaith Chapel Service
- Organized Campfire

Webelos Resident Camp Program

Held at Camp Wakonda

- Boys are grouped into Dens with a staff guide
- Dens rotate through preset activity blocks
- Includes all meals
- Fun Activities
 - Archery, BB, Climbing, Swimming
- Advancement activities
 - Belt loops, Activity pins
- Interfaith Chapel Service
- Organized Campfire, with camper participation

Family Camp - open to groups of all ages

Held at Camp Wakonda – public invited

- Bring your choice of camping unit.
- No set rotation through activity areas.
Take part in all or just R-E-L-A-X.
- Age specific activities
 - Archery, BB, 22 Rifle, Climbing
 - Swimming, Fishing
 - Nature Walks, Stargazing
 - Movie and game night
- Camp-wide potluck dinner
- Interfaith Chapel Service
- Campfire Participation
- Free breakfast on last day.



Volunteer Staff & Assistants

Cub Overnights, and Family Camp

- Bear and Webelos camps are staffed by HHCSR seasonal staff
- Cub Overnights and Family Camp are hosted by and staffed with volunteers.
- National Camp Standards require some staff to have specific certification. (next screen)

Specialized Volunteers

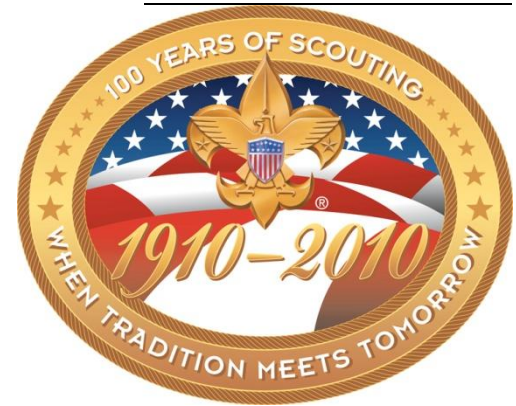
The following positions require specific qualifications:

- Medical personnel
- Shooting Sports – BB, Archery, 22 Rifle
- Climbing – bouldering wall and tower
- Pool supervision, and waterfront

The listing of positions, required qualifications, and a volunteer form are located on council website, under For Volunteer – Scouting Forms – Cub Scout Summer Camp.

Cub Scout Day Camps

- Day camps are four daytime events, coordinated by each district for cub scouts.
- Round Robin Sessions of F-U-N are conducted
- Day camps are coordinated separately from our resident camps.
- Check the council website or a district executive for the contact to obtain specific information for events in each district
