Cub Scout Overnights (Pack Option available)

Open to all registered Cubs and adult partners

- June 19 – 20
- June 26 – 27
- July 17 – 18

Bear Resident Camp

- July 22 – 24

Webelos Resident Camp

- July 8 – 10
- July 18 – 20

Family Resident Camp

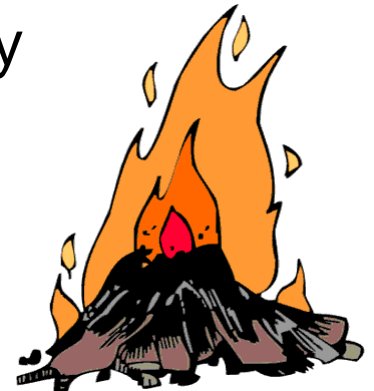
- July 3 – 5 – open to all ages
 - Scouting and Non-Scouting groups
 - Camp in your choice: tents, campers, even motor homes.
- Prices and registration deadlines with on-line registration.



Pack Option

At Cub Scout Overnight only

- Developed for Scout and adult partners who are unable to stay the night but still have an opportunity to spend quality time at our camp
- Program identical – Open Campus
- Depart following campfire
 - Would miss breakfast and morning activity



Camp fees and deadlines

- Registration must be submitted with payment
 - Early Bird special – by 5 pm on Friday, May 14
 - Final Registration is Friday 5 pm 2 weeks prior to each camp
- One free camp t-shirt is given to each registered youth. Adult purchase is optional.

Cub Scout Overnights – Camp Wakonda

- \$40 per Scout (*early bird special*) – *adults are free*
- \$55 per Scout – after early bird

Bear Resident Camp – Camps Waubeek & Wakonda

- \$95 per Scout & \$40 per Leader (*early bird special*)
- \$110 per Scout & \$50 per Leader – after early bird

Webelos Resident Camp – Camp Wakonda

- \$95 per Scout & \$40 per Leader (*early bird special*)
- \$110 per Scout & \$50 per Leader – after early bird

Proper Adult Leadership



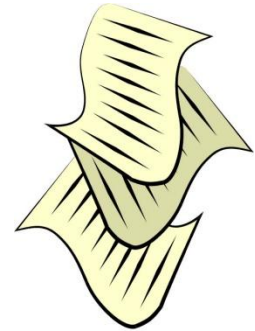
Cub Overnight (including pack option)

- 1 adult partner per Scout

Two-deep leadership for all others, with a ratio of 2 adults per 8 Scouts or fraction thereof

- Bear and Webelos resident camps
- Family resident camp - Troops/patrols or packs/dens need a minimum of 2 deep leadership.

Registration Check List



- On-line registration begins April 1

Full instructions will be given when testing complete.

- Each pack needs a registration coordinator
 - Collect copies of medical forms (next screen)
 - Collect fees and submit registration with payment as a Pack (including medical forms)
- Early Bird registration is May 14, with final deadline indicated for each camp.

Health & Medical Information

BSA Medical Forms required for everyone

- Parts A&C for all campers and staff.
- Part B (physical) recommended, but not required
- Keep original at home, and furnish a copy with registration.

Prescription and over-the-counter drugs

- Medicines must be listed on medical form.
- All medication must be in original container with person's name, with only enough packed for time at camp
- All medication must be turned over to Health Officer upon arrival and kept in that office.. Excluded are medications that must be carried at all times, such as inhalers, Nitro, Epi-pens
- Medicines are available at meal time, or as prescribed.
- Scout is responsible for seeing Health Officer for medicine

Camperships and Refunds

Both forms are available through Council office or website for all camps except Family Camp.



- Campership application deadline May 1
- Refund request deadline September 1

Can be requested for:

- Illness of registered Scout or adult partner
- Illness or death of a family member.
- Relocation outside Council

In September, the amount of refund, if any, is determined by committee.

Accommodations

- Camping sites will be assigned
 - Each site has toilet and running water
 - Handicap accessible campsite available
 - Contact Council Office for details
- Shower
 - Available at swimming pool
 - Risk Management mandates separate facilities for youth/adult and male/female
- Trading Post - open at posted times at all events
 - Scout merchandise, souvenirs, snacks, beverages
 - A small amount of spending money is appropriate (\$10-\$15)

Accommodations

- The council is strongly encouraging all participants to bring their own tents with mosquito netting and floor.
- Camp had some canvas (no floor, no mosquito netting) tents available upon request



Risk Management

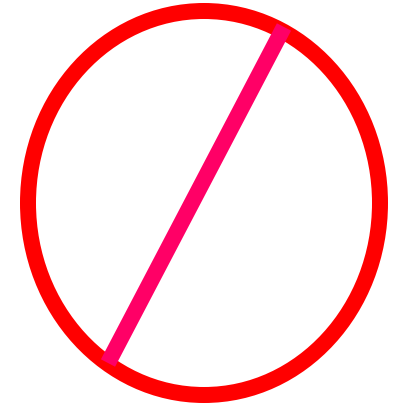
- Identification
 - Staff will have ID tag, campers will have wristbands
 - Visitors will receive a wristband when they check in at Camp Office
- Leaving Camp Early
 - Anyone leaving camp must sign out at Camp Office
 - Known departures should be identified at registration
- Buddy System – no lone Scouts
 - Buddy System will be enforced at all times
- Permission to photograph attendees is on Part C of BSA Medical form

What to Bring (more in parent guide)

- Tent, ground cloth
- Sleeping bag, mattress, pillow
- Full Scout uniform not needed – will get camp shirt
- **Comfortable closed-toed shoes**
- Weather appropriate clothes and underwear , and extras
- Poncho, rain suit, or jacket
- Swim suit and towel
- Water bottle or canteen
- Hat
- Ashes from last year campfire
- Bathroom kit: towel, soap, toothbrush, toothpaste, etc
- Sun screen or sun block (not sun tan lotion)
- Non-aerosol insect repellent
- No aerosols of any kind (except for medical purposes)
- Flashlight, extra batteries
- Pencil and paper
- Scout Handbook
- Spending money
- **Wagon to move items to campsite**

Restricted or Prohibited

**Open toed shoes are a safety risk –
leave them at home.**



Tobacco products

- **Only in designated smoking areas**
- **Never within sight of Scouts**
- **Minors are not allowed in the smoking area**

These will result in immediate dismissal

- **Alcohol – BSA is a alcohol free organization**
- **Illegal Drugs of any kind**
- **Fireworks, sparklers, or other like items**

Cub Overnight Program

Held at Camp Wakonda

- Staffed activities with no set rotation
 - BB gun, Archery
 - Fishing
 - Swimming
 - Crafts
- Advancement items printed in handout to work on their own.
- Meals provided - Dinner and next day breakfast
- Interfaith Chapel Service
- Organized Campfire

Bear Resident Camp Program

Combination of Camps Waubeek and Wakonda

- Boys are grouped into Dens with a staff guide
- Dens rotate through the activity blocks
- Includes all meals
- Fun Activities
 - Archery, BB, Climbing, Swimming, craft
- Advancement activities
 - Belt loops, Achievements, electives
- Interfaith Chapel Service
- Organized Campfire

Webelos Resident Camp Program

Held at Camp Wakonda

- Boys are grouped into Dens with a staff guide
- Dens rotate through the activity blocks
- Includes all meals
- Fun Activities
 - Archery, BB, Climbing, Swimming
- Advancement activities
 - Belt loops, Activity pins
- Interfaith Chapel Service
- Organized Campfire, with camper participation

Family Camp - open to groups of all ages

Held at Camp Wakonda – public invited

- No set rotation through activity areas.
Take part in all or just R-E-L-A-X.
- Age specific activities
 - Archery, BB, 22 Rifle, Climbing
 - Swimming, Fishing
 - Nature Walks, Stargazing
 - Movie and game night
- Camp-wide potluck dinner
- Interfaith Chapel Service
- Campfire Participation
- Free breakfast on last day.



Volunteer Staff & Assistants

Needed at Cub Overnights, Family

- Bear and Webelos camps are staffed by HHCSR seasonal staff
- Cub Overnights and Family Camp are hosted by the districts and staffed primarily by volunteers.
- National Camp Standards require some staff to have specific certification.

Specialized Volunteers

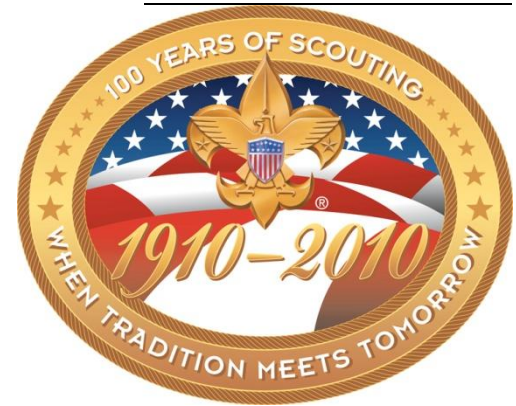
The following positions require specific qualifications:

- Medical personnel
- Shooting Sports – BB, Archery, 22 Rifle
- Climbing – bouldering wall and tower
- Pool supervision, and waterfront

The listing of positions and necessary qualifications and a volunteer form are located on the Camp Leaders information disk.

Cub Scout Day Camps

- Day camps are four day events, coordinated by each district for their cub scouts.
- Round Robin Sessions of F-U-N are conducted only during the day.
