Some of my thoughts:

Red = activities with all camp

Blue = Their own thing

They become acclimated to the schedule that first day by staying up for the entire day and a half (this will allow them to easily fall asleep during the day)

They should do health and pool checks with their troop to ensure that they get those done, but orientation will be discussed with the night owl program as staying in Waubeek will change some things a bit.

They will have extra sleep between Friday during the day and Friday night, however by then should be tired enough to sleep both

During their 5-hour merit badge blocks they can take a 45 minute break in the middle for Waubeek free-time

If they want to participate in mile swim (or even Iron Man) they have that ability if they wish and we can work to make it happen.

Between Tuesday and Thursday open areas they will have the opportunity to visit all areas of camp. On top of that they will have Friday afternoon free time to explore their interests more.

The first day's meals can be pre-determined, but since we have patrol-meals as an option out at camp why not put it to use and allow the boys to plan their meals? ...within reason of course!
